#### **Teaching and Learning**

Everyone is a learner at Flagstone State Community College. We are committed to life-long learning to ensure we are united and committed to ensuring every child the best opportunity to succeed with clear pathways to future learning. This term, the spotlight has been on the adoption of clear learning routines and engagement. Teachers have been implementing the Australian Curriculum with a focus on developing students metacognitive skills to monitor their learning and plan their next steps through the use of annotated exemplars, graphic organiser scaffolding and learning walls. Students and teachers alike have been utilizing Qlearn departmental elearning platform to support student engagement with resources, submit assessments and complete revision/ homework. To support students ability to fully engage in learning students are invited to bring their laptop to school each and everyday.

Miss Sung Instrumental Music Coordinator Music Teacher Flagstone was lucky enough to win an Academy for Enterprising Girls Grant for \$3000. This meant we could provide a fully funded one-day workshop delivered by Young Change Agent and co-facilitate by our Head of Inquiry Jane McLaren.

The Academy for Enterprising Girls is funded through the Australian Government's Future Female Entrepreneurs Grant, since 2019 the Academy for Enterprising Girls Workshops reached over 12,000 budding young female entrepreneurs aged 10 to 18 years old given the opportunity to develop their skills in these hands-on STEM, entrepreneurship and design thinking workshops.

"How might we reimagine the Future of Food?"



Year 9 Food and Fibre and Year 7 & 9 Inquiry students participated in a full day workshop where they could have a chance to use their knowledge and skills from this term and see how they transfer to business and STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) professions.

The choices we make about what we eat affect not only our wellbeing but also the health of our planet. As the world's population continues to grow, and as climate change disrupts traditional agricultural practices, we must develop sustainable and resilient food systems to ensure everyone has access to nutritious and affordable food.

The Future of Food challenge offers opportunities for meaningful application of curriculum such as (but not limited to):

- Technologies students can become creative and responsive designers, developing quality designed solutions for identified needs and opportunities across food systems and understanding the application of technology in agriculture and food supply chains.
- Civics and Citizenship students hone their inquiry skills, which enables them to be active and informed citizens who question, understand and contribute to sustainable food futures.
- Humanities and Social Sciences by tapping into personal to global contexts in relation to food and food security and considering future challenges, students build their capacity to be active and informed citizens. Also exposing students to solving food challenges through the creation of social and environmental impact businesses.
- Home Economics/Food Technology enabling students to be exposed to the challenges of feeding Australia and the world's population and potentially creating their own food of the future.
- Cross Curriculum Priorities sustainability through understanding systems, design, world context and futures and exploring of indigenous and cultural food practices and land management.

Big thank you to Miss Kirsty Stewart, Mrs Kate Sorensen and Gabrielle Ekueti (Prac.Teacher) who came and immersed themselves with the children. Also Mrs Jessica MacKenzie who helped with the judging and feedback to groups in their final Pitches.

Looking forward to seeing how the girls ideas go against other students across the state where the finalist will be announced in this national entrepreneurial competition.

Mrs McLaren will be offering a lunchtime Explorers club to any students interested in pursuing their ideas.
